SLATE RUN LIVING HISTORICAL FARM

Slate Run Living Historical Farm is a working 19th-century farm, with huge old barn, an assortment of horses, chickens, other animals, old horse-drawn machines which are actually used, and everything needed for a pre-motorized farm. Likewise, the house is fully equipped in late-19th-century furniture and kitchen devices, and usually cooking is going on there. Though it is outside of Franklin County, it is part of the Metro Park system. It right next to a regular park with picnic areas, etc. We will aim for Sat. June 13, with a rain date of June 27. Our plan is to meet at the Methodist Church Parking lot at 9 a.m. for car-pooling. Bring a picnic lunch for yourselves. We will want to get to Slate Run Farm by 10 a.m., tour the house and barns & then go to a nearby picnic area in Slate Run Park for our lunch. HILLIARD HISTORICAL VILLAGE

The Hilliard Historical Society, known as the Northwest Franklin County Historical Society & Museum, has a whole collection of buildings which are arranged like a little village on the edge of the Franklin County Fairgrounds. They include an 1876 church, an 1814 school, a train station, train signal, and caboose, an 1850 granary, an old barn, a vintage voting booth, a gazebo, and a reproduction covered bridge. There is an admission charge of \$8. for adults, \$7. for senior citizens, and \$1. for students. The hours are Thursdays, 4–8, Saturdays 4–8, and Sundays 1–4 p.m. We will try for Sunday afternoon, July 19, with a fall-back date of Sunday, July 26. A VIEW FROM THE GYM

Despite the occasional rain showers and the unfamiliar layout of booths and rides, Founders Day turned out to be well worth all the work to put it on. Outdoors, behind the elementary school gym, there were huge crowds all day, milling around the food booths and

> riding the rides. But when the occasional rain showered down, the school art show, which was quite spectacular, and the gym filled up with plenty of wet people to look at the displays.

> There were a dozen or more tables of exhibits in the gym (5 of which were OURS). Our old photos, our Heritage Quilt, David's collection of "What Is It?" antique objects, and the reproduction antique toys attracted a lot of attention. The kids loved playing with the jumping jacks and bats with balls on a string. Marilyn Regrut's antique button display and Marty Saveson's rug-braiding also attracted appreciative visitors. Perhaps our most eye-catching display (after the Heritage quilt) was the New Albany High School band uniform, along with the 1907 cornet, both of which were used in the band by Alexander Doran in 1912.

NOTES & NEWS

The ROCKY FURK METRO PARK in the northwest corner of Plain Township is under construction. Trails are being created, restrooms and at least one shelter are already going up, and informational signboards are being made. Some of our Society members have been asked for help in describing former mills and dwellings, Native American artifacts, and the geology of the area. We have seen some of the signs during the planning process, and they are both beautiful and instructive. We are told that portions of the new Park will be open by summer.

RECENT SPEAKERS: At our recent Society meetings we have been privileged to hear from several experts on subjects pertinent to the Ealy House. In April, Jillian Carney, the Manager of Digital Services in the Outreach Division of the Ohio History Connection, gave us a lot of useful advice on how to preserve our documents, photographs, and other important papers. She was accompanied by Mark Sundlov, also from the Ohio History Connection, where he is the Executive Secretary of the Ohio Local History Alliance, which means that he helps organizations like ours to learn about our local history and how to help local residents and school children understand their own local history.

At our May meeting we were fortunate to have Constance Mengel analyze the graining and faux painting on the woodwork and the doors in the upstairs and downstairs halls of the Ealy House. She is an expert in 19th-century American grain painting and gave us quite an interesting talk on the itinerant artisans who did such work. She pointed out different styles of brushwork on our dining room door and showed us various kinds of tools that would have been used.

The new so-called "1 - 8" school building was open to visitors duing Founders Day. Quite a few of us took advantage of it during one of the downpours that day. Some of us were lucky enough to have a 4thgrader whose classroom was in that building this past year show us around. It is truly a marvelous building, unlike any traditional school. There are many open spaces, no regular hallways, many sets of classrooms which can be opened up together, a cafeteria on every floor, a roof garden, and a greenhouse. Half the chairs in each classroom are rocking chairs (for fidgety kids); beanbag seats are in the lounge areas. There is an assembly room on each floor, complete with a stage. Let's have a Society meeting there sometime!

And the Ealy House, with another set of volunteers, will be open from noon until 3 p.m.

NEW HUSINESS: We donated a "Cat's Meow" miniature model of the old high school to the Founder's Day silent auction. Robert Dean will try to sell some more of our Cat's Meows at his 50th class reunion.

ANNUNCEMENTS: The ribbon-cutting ceremony for Resch Park has been tentatively re-scheduled for July 4, assuming that Bill Resch's knee operation will allow him to attend.

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CLASS OF 1965 CELEBRATES 50th

On May 23, 1965, Dr. Glyde Marsh, then President of the NAPT Board of Education, handed out diplomas to 40 graduating high school seniors on the stage of the gym in the 1925 school building. Exactly 50 years later, on May 23, 2015, Dr. Glyde Marsh handed out Golden A's to 13 members of that same class, on the same stage in the same building. Dr. Marsh gave a short talk after the recent ceremony, in which he described the problems the School District had gone through in 1965. The group then gathered for lunch at the Rusty Bucket, where they were joined by 2 more class members.

Alumnus Robert Dean, who had organized the day's events, had put together a souvenir booklet for everybody, containing photographs from the past and copies of documents of interest to the class of 1965. It should be added that he drove to the events in his 1963 Lark, the very same car he had driven during his high school years. Later that day everyone gathered at Debbie and Robert Dean's big barn for pizza and further reminiscing.
