We are looking forward to this annual event, which will take place at Dorans' farm, 5462 Babbitt Road. We have the usual high hopes for good weather and enthusiastic participation on the part of our members. We are committed to sponsoring the following activities: Bake Sale, Apple Butter sale, Scarecrow-making, Candle-dipping, 50/50, and a big Food Table (with bean soup in the huge old cauldron, sloppy joes, soft drinks, and cider both hot and cold).

NEW BOOKLET ON EALY HOUSE

To celebrate having the Ealy House officially listed on the National Register of Historical Places, John Saveson has put together a new book, which is fuller than the first one (published a year ago). The substance of the book is the material which he researched and wrote for the Society's application to place the Ealy House on the National Register. It is illustrated by many of the photographs taken by John for the application, most of them in color. The booklet is available free to Society members and to non-members who are interested.

It has been a landmark since 1881, and it served our Society well from 1994 until 2004.

JAMES FODOR, 1928-2008

Jim Fodor was born in Columbus, but grew up in Jefferson Township, surrounded by a large family. He graduated from Lincoln High School in Gahanna and later went on to become a State Auditor and a member of the Franklin County Board of Elections. He moved to Plain Township after his marriage to Naomi Swickard 53 years ago.

Had he chosen to become a professional politician, Jim Fodor would have been very successful. This good-natured man enjoyed people. He was thoughtful of others, kind to everyone, and a playful teaser. He never knew a stranger, according to Naomi. He loved children, and they loved him. Seemingly without any effort, he was rewarded with admiration and respect from people of all ages.

Who else would gather three octogenarian ladies together and drive them in his car to lead the parade for the start of the 1978 Founders Day celebration? The smiling threesome were Nina Estle (widow of the local doctor), Ethel Schleppi (the oldest Plain Township resident, who was born in 1886 and lived to be 102), and Lizzie Swickard (his mother-in-law). These jewels had their day!

He was proud of his well-equipped blue tractor and his large electric organ, but especially proud of his and Naomi's lovely homes in New Albany and in Ellenton, Florida. They both loved to beautify their yards with flowers, shrubs, and trees. Many folks have fond memories of the delicious grapefruit picked from the Fodors' own tree in Florida. Here in the north, Jim's special pride was his many, many apple trees. At Christmas time, he and Naomi lavishly decorated the home on old 161 both inside and outside. The lights brought viewers to the community.

Jim was, like Naomi, a faithful member of the United Methodist Church and the New Albany-Plain

Township Historical Society, and very generous to both organizations. His famous peanut butter fudge was a favorite item at church bazaars and Historical Society bake sales. At the annual Harvest the Arts Festival, we would see him in bib-overalls, straw hat, and red bandanna, pressing apples (many from his own orchard or donated by him) into cider for thirsty customers.

Jim Fodor died on Monday, August 18. Many of the community residents have wonderful memories of him. We will all miss Jim very, very much.




