INTRODUCING JULIA ROGERS, DENISON SENIOR

We have recently had the pleasure of meeting Julia Rogers, a Denison University Theatre and Sociology/Anthropology major, who, for the culmination of her studies, is doing research on New Albany and Plain Township. She has already interviewed several members of our Society, has joined us at our barn party on July 6th, and has attended a session of the Heritage Quilters. Her own description of her project is as follows:

"I am undertaking a research project in the form of a 'docudrama' to present the recent history and current community of New Albany, Ohio. To gather the research necessary for this project, I am interviewing present and former members of New Albany to best understand the voices that make up this American town. My primary aim in conducting these interviews will eventually be to not only study and learn about this particular town, but also to gain a sense of what creates a community in this moment in history. The research project will be written in the form of a play compiled with text from the interviews as well as from community events, newspaper articles, published material, advertisements, official statements and other primary source materials."

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE MAY 25th BOARD MEETING

- 1. The Ealy House -- discussion of Phase 2: Estimates are needed from Durable Slate for future projects, including the back porch, a kitchenette, outside grading, & interior decorating. These estimates are needed for our own information, but also for applying for possible grants for the projects.
- 2. The National Register of Historic Places -- One requirement for being included is that the town have a Preservation Ordinance. Mayor Nancy Ferguson will look into this. Neil Hitch's report on the condition and architecture of the Ealy House has been sent to the Preservation Office, along with the preliminary application. Uses planned for the Ealy House must also be listed on the application. The Society will be asked to vote on these at the next meeting.
- 3. The web site was discussed in connection with making it useful for grant applications, as well as more useful for current and prospective members. Material on the Ealy House should now be added, as well as more information on the Dryer place, the Historical Markers, and the Heritage Quilt. The Newsletters might be included. Also, for a non-profit organization, the web site should not have a ".com" address.

MINUTES OF THE SOCIETY MEETING OF JUNE 1st

The meeting was called to order by President Kim Cathell. The minutes of the May meeting were read from the June/July Newsletter and were approved as printed. The Treasurer's report was given and approved as read.

The Society's participation in the community's July 4th activities was discussed. Due to the uncertainty about the move to the Ealy House, it was decided to not participate in the parade.

We discussed the usage of the rooms in the Ealy House. The motion was made by Betty Maynard and seconded by Kathy Yager to accept the proposed use of rooms as outlined in the June/July Newsletter in order to apply for grants and for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places. Motion passed. It is understood that plans for room usage could be amended as the final move is made. Kim has spoken to the Durable Slate foreman regarding the Society's desire to have a walk-through with him to verify that all contract items have been completed before the final payment is made.

Meeting adjourned. No 50/50 because of small crowd.

Following the meeting we enjoyed a slide show of significant landmarks in Southeastern Ohio presented by Vernon Pack from the Westerville Historical Society. Excellent refreshments were provided by Helen & Ed Holter. --Helen Pestel, Secretary pro tem.
